High Country Tour




The Model A Ford Club of Colorado hosted the 2023 Regional Meet in Breckenridge, Colorado. With an elevation of 9,600 feet above sea level, the meet lived up to its name "High Country".

The Wichita A's had 14 attendees with five Model A's representing our club. Entire attendance was estimated at 122 cars with close to 300 people. In total, 17 states (AZ, CA, CO, IA, ID, IL, KS, KY, MA, MO, MT, NE, OK, TN, TX, UT, WY) and one couple from New Zealand were represented. Accommodations, meeting rooms, parking lot games were held at the Beaver Run Resort. BIG FACILITY, but very nice.

The meet kicked off the week of activities with a short evening presentation on Sunday, June 11 by Flint Whitlock titled "Skiing Off to War with the 10th Mountain Division." Mr. Whitlock is a Denver based author who has written 17 books and also a guest lecturer on Viking cruises and tour guide for European battlefields. Not having any knowledge of the 10th Mountain Division I walked away from the presentation in awe of the soldiers who volunteered to be a part of the 10th Mountain Division. Training at high attitude for war in the mountains, learning to snow ski, carrying 100lb. back-packs, sleeping, eating and living in the cold at high altitude – wow! Camp Hale was built specifically for the 10th Mountain Division and we had an opportunity to see the camp remains as we scaled the mountain in our Model A's on a trip later in the week to Leadville.

Monday, June 12 provided our first mountain road test challenge. Leaving Breckenridge, we drove ten miles to the summit of Hoosier Pass. The pass is 11,542 feet high! With tight switchbacks and substantial grades, our Model A's were duly tested. Beautiful view but cold and cloudy. Reaching the top we descended the mountain to Fairplay. At an elevation of 9,953 feet, the town is the fifth highest incorporated place in the State of Colorado.

On Monday evening, June 12, our host provided a welcome party with buffet dinner and carnival games that allowed players to earn millions of play dollars and spend the millions later in the evening on auctioned prizes.





Tuesday, June 13 provided a Summit County Scavenger Hunt. Participants in the scavenger hunt drove a total of 55 miles on a journey of discovery. Stops included the Breckenridge Troll, Barney Ford Museum, Valley Brook Cemetery, Frisco, Dillon, Arapahoe Ski Basin and Loveland Pass Summit. Along the way, participants collected a card at each stop that told about the attraction. On the back of each card was printed a portion of the High Country tour emblem so that once the tour was completed the participant had a finished emblem. Very creative!

Tuesday evening entertainment consisted of "Celebrating 50 Years of the Hubley Derby." Unbeknownst to me was the fact that the Hubley Derby originated at the 1973 Colorado High Country Tour held in Vail, Colorado. Originally created as an event for kids 7 to 15, the Hubley was so popular that two years later the race was opened to adults. (Hmm – we are all just big kids)!




Thursday, June 15 brought on the Big Drive – Breckenridge to Leadville Loop. The round trip distance was 116 miles with our Model A's climbing three mountain passes above 10,000 feet; Vail, Tennessee and Fremont. We had a beautiful scenic drive through the mountains as we drove through Frisco, the gold & silver mining town of Minturn, Red Cliff Bridge, and crossed the Continental Divide. Arriving in Leadville (elevation 10,152 ft) we enjoyed lunch in the highest incorporated city in the United States .

The evening entertainment was provided by many club members from the Colorado Model A Club who presented "The Do's and Don'ts of Era Etiquette". The spoof on manners during the Model A era was based on a 1930 edition of "Standard Etiquette for All Occasions."

Friday, June 16 was the final day for the High Country Tour. The Colorado Club set up four driving games; Goin Fishin, Save the Cow Bell, Gold Nugget Toss and "A" Drink Sir, provided several opportunities for Model A drivers and passenger to prove their Model A driving skills and have some competitive fun. Friday evening provided music by **Jim Calm** (a retired music teacher) performing music from the past on an electric keyboard and standup comedian, **Nancy Norton** (a retired nurse), winner of 2021 Best of the Fest Show with Jay Leno, 2019 Champion of the 40th Annual Seattle International Comedy Competition and host of other comedy accolades. Nancy was very entertaining and provided a great ending for the Colorado High Country Tour.

Reviewing our week in Breckenridge, we conquered five mountain passes (Vail, Loveland, Hoosier, Tennessee and Fremont). We visited several mountain towns including Vail, Keystone, Frisco, Dillon, Minturn and Fairplay. We learned about the 10th Mountain Division which trained at Camp Hale near Minturn, learned about the Hubley Derby history, participated in two technical seminars for the men and the Colorado Club provided two equally interesting seminars for the ladies.

Wow! A lot of activity and learning opportunity in a short period of time. My drive home provided me with time to reflect on the week and I am convinced that had I had a Model A Ford when I was about 12 or 13 I would have had a greater appreciation for weather science, history, geography – ugh, pretty much everything being taught in school. Who knows, I might have been my class valedictorian! I am convinced more than ever, the Model A brings out the best! Happy motoring – ahooga!

TECH ARTICLE

CLUTCH PEDAL FREE-PLAY

Have you checked your clutch pedal free-play lately? This is the first movement of the pedal where there is only a little resistance. According to Ford this is supposed to be 3/4" to 7/8" and can readily be adjusted by screwing the clutch link in or out of the trunnion.

The important thing is that you have 3/4" free-play, for without any, it has the same effect on the clutch and engine as riding the clutch pedal with your foot.

You should not have your foot on the clutch pedal except when you are in the act of shifting gears.

What does riding the clutch pedal do to your clutch and engine you may ask?

Simply this: riding the clutch pedal keeps a constant pressure on the clutch assembly and on the engine crankshaft as well as unnecessarily spinning the throw-out bearing. This could result in premature wear on the clutch faces and throw-out bearing.


Even more serious, it may force the lubrication out of the rear main bearing babbitt thrust face causing the premature wear of the babbitt, resulting in end play of the crankshaft and damage to pistons, rings and other critical parts.


